^{*}Note on originality: Since most students will be basing their questions on the same source material, it is understandable if there are similar questions about a topic. This is okay as long as it does not become a pattern, and as long as more complex questions (i.e. those requiring higher levels of critical thinking) do not frequently overlap.

Report any questions if they look suspicious, especially if you see multiple instances of the same "complex" question.
